presenting finalist REV. DR. ALBERT BAILEY, JR. '05



Rev. Dr. Albert Bailey Jr. is a native of Detroit, MI, currently residing in Windsor, CT. He serves as the pastor of Shiloh Baptist Church in Hartford, CT, and is an adjunct professor of logic and ethics at Wilberforce University. Dr. Bailey holds an undergraduate degree from Wilberforce (2005), a master's degree from Payne Theological Seminary, and a doctorate from United Theological Seminary. He is a lifelong learner and highly educated individual.

In addition to his academic and pastoral roles, Dr. Bailey is actively involved in several organizations. He is a member of the Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity Inc. and the Prince Hall Masons. He is also the founder of the "Little About a Lot" podcast and the Teerific Golf Foundation.

Dr. Bailey is a member of the American Baptist Church, the National Baptist Church, and the NAACP. He also contributes his expertise to the DEEP State of Connecticut Departments of Environmental Energy Protection.

Outside of his professional commitments, Dr. Bailey is happily married to Erica Bailey (class of 2006) and is the proud father of four children. He is involved in various other organizations, further demonstrating his dedication to making a positive impact in his community.

presenting finalist SELVENA N. BROOKS-POWERS '05



Selvena N. Brooks-Powers represents the 31st District which includes the communities of Arverne, Brookville, Edgemere, Laurelton, Springfield Gardens, Rosedale, and Far Rockaway. She was elected in a special election in February 2021. She was appointed as the first ever woman to serve as the New York City Council Majority Whip and Chair of the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, respectively.

A fierce advocate for equity in city resources, Selvena Brooks-Powers helped to secure \$95 million in restoration to fund the 116th Precinct, expand the Cure Violence program into the 105th Precinct, establish a permanent COVID-19 vaccine site during the height of the pandemic, and secure \$7 million to complete funding to build a new state-of-the-art school. A dedicated public servant for 17 years and lifelong resident of Southeast Queens, Selvena Brooks-Powers is the proud daughter of immigrant parents. and devoted to fighting for what's right and delivering results. As a community organizer, Selvena drove high-impact initiatives on critical issues, including education, voting rights and empowerment, racial and economic justice, relief efforts post-Hurricane Katrina and Superstorm Sandy, M/WBE opportunities, and workers' rights.

Immediately prior to elected office, Selvena was a manager for M/WBE compliance, external affairs, and community outreach on the \$13 billion JFK International Airport Redevelopment Program. Previously, Selvena worked for the Service Employees International Union (SEIU) family as a communications director for various campaigns, including the Fight for \$15 campaign across numerous states, and on one of the tightest Congressional races to win back the majority in the U.S. Congress. Selvena also helped mobilize and ultimately unionized co-workers under the United Media Guild of the Communications Workers of America (CWA), where she was unanimously elected delegate for the northeast region.

Selvena's prior experiences in government span from the New York State Senate Majority Conference Leader, the New York City Mayor's Office to Combat Domestic Violence, and even as a teen volunteer for the first New York City Public Advocate.

She is the recipient of several awards and recognition, which includes: City & State 2023, Power of Diversity: Black 100, 2022 Transportation Power100, Powers Women of Queens, Queens Power 100, Campaign Against Hunger Harvest Hero, Care USA Hunger Hero.

A proud HBCU alumna, Selvena is a graduate of Wilberforce University, the first privately owned and operated HBCU where she was initiated into the Beta Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. She also holds a M.S. in International Law from New York University. Selvena is a homeowner in Rockaway Beach with her husband, their daughter, and dog.

presenting finalist JANELLE HOCKER '04



Janelle Hocker is an inspirational woman of color with a passion for empowering young minds and uplifting her community. Her journey began with volunteering at the Black Family Reunion, where she had the privilege of meeting the late Dr. Dorothy Height, a transformative moment that sparked her aspirations. Dr. Height encouraged Janelle to pursue her dreams and obtain a college degree, a path that she embraced with determination.

Inspired by the remarkable legacy of the late Dr. Mary McCloud Bethune, Janelle set her sights even higher. In 1999, she achieved a momentous honor by standing beside the statue of Dr. Bethune at Bethune Cookman University. The trailblazing spirit of Dr. Bethune, who founded her own school for girls with only \$1.92, motivated Janelle to create "A Step Higher," a college tour program aimed at preparing young students for higher education.

Over the course of 23 years, Janelle's passion for education and philanthropy led her to inspire more than 5,200 high school students across the nation to pursue and succeed in college. Through her efforts, she raised an impressive \$475,000 in scholarships for deserving students attending Historically Black Colleges and Universities or their college of choice. Janelle's commitment to personal growth and education led her to graduate from Wilberforce University's esteemed (Climb) Program in 2004. Encouraged by her professors to pursue her dreams fearlessly, she later embarked on a journey to obtain a degree in Mental Health Counseling at Lindsey Wilson Graduate School in 2015.

In 2019, Janelle became a proud member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc., embracing sisterhood and a shared mission to impact positive change in society. Her journey took an unexpected turn in 2013 when a generous donation presented her with a red house in Walnut Hills. This gift inspired her dream to create a space for tutoring services, but destiny had bigger plans for her.

In 2015, Nella's Place was born—a home for girls aged 15-21, with a mission to mend their minds, bodies, and spirits. Her dedication to helping others continued with the opening of Nella's Place 2 in 2017 for girls aged 8-14, and Nella's Place 3 in 2018 for boys aged 8-14. By 2023, Nella's Place 4 was established, offering care and support for older boys aged 14-21. These homes provide trauma counseling, drug counseling, tutoring services, and mentoring programs for the children in their care.

Janelle's journey is rooted in her desire to be a positive and conscious Black woman. Inspired by her mother's impactful influence, she carries a torch of strength, motivation, and inspiration to empower others. As a single mother of two sons, Reggie, and Isaiah Revels, who have become entrepreneurs themselves, Janelle's legacy of resilience and community upliftment continues to shine brightly.

With unwavering dedication and a heart committed to making a difference, Janelle S. Hocker leaves an indelible mark on the lives of countless young individuals, shaping a better future for all.

presenting finalist **DR. SHAMARH J. HUTCHINS '07**



Dr. Shamarah J. Hutchins raised by her maternal grandmother. Currently Dr. Hutchins is a professor at local colleges in Cleveland, Ohio, she's the assistant basketball coach for Maple Heights High School and Dr. Hutchins also serves as a member of the National Society of Leadership and Success, sit as the Program Chair for the TJ Carrie Foundation, the Co-Chair for Black Girls CLE and on the Warrensville Developmental Center Advisory Board. She is also a proud member of the Order of Eastern Star and Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority Inc.

Out of everything accomplished, the greatest accomplishment of them all is that of wife to Charles Hutchins and mom to Gabrielle and Madison. Dr. Hutchins is grounded in Cognitive Behavior Therapy (CBT) but understands a person-centered approach is needed to build a strong bond between self and client. Sarah A. Muse is an east coast native of Baltimore, MD. She introduced herself to the state of Ohio over 25 years ago when she began her educational career at Wilberforce University, where she obtained a B.S in Accounting. Sarah matriculated to obtain her M.Ed. in Clinical Mental Health Counseling from The University of Dayton.

Sarah has two beautiful daughters named Ameera and Amodesty. Sarah manages to devote time to servicing her community through mentoring and active membership with the Alpha Kappa Alpha

Sorority, Inc. Beta Eta Omega Chapter in addition to her multifaceted professional career.

As a multidimensional professional, Sarah embraced one of her many luxurious hobbies and followed in her family's footsteps, by entering the entrepreneurial world as a passionate novice in her trade. She took her exquisite attraction for fragrances, which was inspired and enhanced by her mothers' unique elegance and aromatic style and began selling a variation of essential oils. She introduced oils to the community in 2000s as a vendor at various events, and local Flea Markets; as her clientele began to grow, thus did her products.

Due to high demand, in 2012, the business name of 'Unique Aromas' was endorsed, and Sarah quickly realized that her ability to advise, and introduce consumers to fragrances that complement their body and home was an innovative and therapeutic skill that she was naturally proficient at. Since the start of 'Unique Aromas,' the growth has included a two-store front location, a variety of Aroma Oil Lamps, Soaps, Shea Butters (scented and non), a create your own scent option, and an inventory of over 1200, continuously growing oils.

The Black Women of Wallstreet Movement in Dayton, OH, was founded because of Sarah being inspired by the achievements and pioneering spirit of O.W. Gurley and several of his business partners, who were able to contribute to the success of the "original " 'Black Wall Street' in Tulsa Oklahoma. The Black Women of Wallstreet Movement brings women entrepreneurs together to provide them with a network of women who promote, uplift, support one another. Sarah also hosts The Black Wallstreet Shopping Market at the Central State University West Campus, twice a year. The Black Wallstreet Shopping Market brings 30 Black Owned Businesses together to showcase in the community their business while providing an environment to network, promote, and sell their products. As the Founder of BMORE Ambitious Mentoring group, Sarah is inspired to be like mogul Anne Malone, who was a Black Female Millionaire. Anne Malone owned and operated the first African American orphanage in St. Louis. As well as made donations to the YWCA and other charitable organizations.

Sarah founded BMORE Ambitious to provide programming for women and girls in the city with the tools to live productive lives through educational development, leadership, entrepreneurship, community service, and holistic wellness. Along with that, every year with the help of Holly's Hope and volunteers in the community, Sarah host Soulful Thanksgiving, where she feeds the Men & Women's Shelter. At this present time, Sarah is working to open her group home BMORE Ambition to service girls ages 10 to 19 years of age.

presenting finalist TOMMY NICHOLS '06



A multi-talented creative media and technology professional. Tommy Nichols is the CEO of the Charlotte Black Film Festival <u>www.charlotteblackfilmfestival.com</u>, IOCTV, a 24hour streaming network created to support African American content creators which was selected as the best /virtual event in Charlotte by Queen City Nerve in 2021 www.ioctv.net.

In addition, Tommy founded the Charlotte/Carolina Black Film Collective (which has over 1400 members), an organization that trains and equips African Americans in

film, TV Production and digital skills <u>https://www.meetup.com/charlotte-</u> <u>carolinablackfilmcollective/</u>.

He is a founding member of Indie Media Arts South https://www.imasouth.org/, a subgroup of the National Indie Media Arts Field Group, created by The National Endowment for the Arts and Sundance Institute to continue the collaborations of leaders of independent media arts organizations across the United States. In 2020 and 2021, he was hired by the National Endowment for the Arts to review and recommend \$4 million in grants to media arts organizations across the US. In 2018, the mayor of Charlotte appointed him to the Charlotte Mecklenburg Public Access Corporation (TV 21) board of directors, and he has been board chair for the past three years.

In 2022 he was hired as a consultant for the inaugural AfroSouth Film Festival in Charleston, SC. The Charlotte Black Film Festival has been a screening partner for Marvel, Sony, Lionsgate and Fox studios. He was the video producer for the winning campaigns of Charlotte City Council women Dimpa Amera, Mecklenburg County Sheriff Gary McFadden and Mecklenburg County Judge C. Renee Little.

With over twenty years of experience in technology, media, and workforce development education, Tommy founder Power Up USA a 5013c organization that helps close the digital divide by providing technology and digital media training to over 2,200 youth, adults and Seniors www.powerupusa.org He is the recipient of the Business Journal's 40 under 40, The YMCA Black Achievers award, The Lifesaver award from Kennedy Charter school, The 2019 Charlotte Black History Maker from WCCB TV, and was nominated for the Mayor's Educator Mentor of the year. In addition to his many awards, Nichols has been featured on ABC, NBC, FOX, CBS, the Charlotte Observer, Digital Journal and recently the FEature Cover of Pride Magazine Charlotte, just to name a few.

I watched my mom work until she would reach exhaustion. I think that is what instilled this drive I have. I went to three high schools in four years and ended up not graduating on time. I took credit recovery and what was supposed to take an extra year I finished the first semester. Still at this time college was far from my mind, and I spent the rest of 2007 and

2008 working any job I could find. One day I came home, and my mom mentioned that I should apply to Wilberforce University. After a wonderful conversation and the mention of going to the military I applied for Wilberforce. I was accepted and on August 8th, 2008 I started my journey at The Wilberforce University.

My students know that from the first day you walk into Mr. B's classroom, you are going to leave a better person. I believe that my mother and her mother set us up from Heaven. She is the most important woman to me in this world and I cannot thank her enough for putting up with all of my foolishness.
